I vaguely remember the day when Dr. Rajani Rai met me at my home to help the Dept. of Drawing and Painting at the Seminary Hills Campus of the Lady Amritabai Daga (LAD) College on the Seminary Hills, with a proposal to set-up the independent Architecture Department.

Approval was obtained for starting a Technical course from All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE) in New Delhi, as well as the Dept. of Technical Education of the State Govt. in Mumbai. A class room for 30 girl students was then located on the First Floor of the Main Building of the LAD Campus on the Seminary Hills Nagpur. Gradually, the demand for admissions increased to the intake of 120 presently!

Norms for Admission are prescribed by the Council of Architecture for an Aptitude Test and personal interviews.

On the other hand the Teacher – Student Ratio of 1:10 required dozens of teachers and Practicing Architects to conduct Studios and Theory lectures.

In 1956 when I was admitted to the Sir J.J. School of Architecture, in Bombay the Intake was 30 students with only 3 girl students then.

Considering the demand of practicing Architects today, we might need to open 30 schools every 3 years

BRAIN GYM-AN ESSENTIAL WORKOUT FOR CREATING

PROF. ATULA PATWARDHAN M.F.A.(APPLIED ART)

Through the study of art, students are encouraged to value and respond to their own perceptions, observations, emotions, and intuition.

We, the Fine Arts teacher works to ensure that at each level of our program, students not only build skills, but also become more comfortable and confident in meeting the challenges of aesthetic self-expression.

We employ techniques that liberate and deepen our students' power of expression and challenge them to reconcile the powers of emotion and intuition with intellectual ability. In order to enable students to achieve success through creative effort, the visual arts teaches basic concepts which form the foundation for more advanced study. Through the aesthetic education students find new ways to perceive their world the appraisal of art helps our students find a relationship between themselves and the lives and art of other individuals and cultures. By teaching aesthetic literacy, teachers expand their students' awareness of the world and their relationship to it.

Our arts program is designed so that student can explore the expressive potential of a variety of areas. Through guided exploration in the classroom, student use their experiences and knowledge to explore and express their ideas visually using a variety of tools and materials. They become able to speak in "a hundred languages." Whether it is with clay, paper, paint, colored pencils, markers, wire or glue, we want students to find out what materials can do and what they can do with them.

We encourage students to achieve independence in working with the various creative media and to express ideas clearly in a visual format. Painting and drawing skills are developed through observation, invented abstraction and fantasy. Color theory is introduced and students are expected to know how to use primary colors and to make secondary and intermediate colors. Three-dimensional perception and construction skills are enhanced through clay work and mixed media construction projects.

In the production of art, students use a variety of materials such as oil pastels, watercolors, acrylics and tempera paints, colored markers, printer's ink, India ink, pencils, paper-mâché, vine charcoal, and adhesives

The goals of the art program is to promote visual literacy, foster a deeper understanding and appreciation for the world of art, and provide students with the necessary tools for self-discovery. Students are encouraged to communicate their feelings and ideas through visual expression and to analyze, interpret, and evaluate their own work as well as the efforts of others.

Visual art assignments are basically meaningful creative exercises. I have designed with conscious and continuous efforts since last 18 years, so as to make it applicable to the Architectural Design.

Our creative team is providing opportunities to partake in problem-solving approaches that stimulate the ability to see, to express, and to invent. Students cultivate an understanding, enjoyment and appreciation of the arts through study and practice in the studio. dark room. Fine Arts studio classes provide students the opportunity to nurture their art. Making skills and allow them to work toward developing and refining their own individual style and aesthetic awareness.



WHAT IS LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE?

In the summer of 2001, I was in Mumbai for an entrance exam. I toured the city in my spare time, and, after a bit of sightseeing, ended up at the



Hater realized that something was greenery. There wasn't a single tree on the property and everything seemed barren and alien. Surely they must have incorporated a landscape scheme late, but when I saw the complex, with its standing buildings and no greenery around, the setting seemed dull and dreary.

The dictionary meaning of landscape is all visible features on land, Most governing bodies name their landscape developments projects as "beautification" rather than calling them landscape development. However, the profession of landscape architecture goes beyond mere beautification. It goes far beyond making mehendi borders around lawns and executing planting schemes.

Alandscape professional would start by analyzing the site, conducting detailed analyses of



slope, water flow, soil, and sunlight at different times of thy. They also consider access roads, surrounding buildings, and existing physical site features for efficient site planning. To account for the needs of the client as well as the conditions at the site, they frequently make changes before a final design is approved.

Hiring a gardener or a planting contractor, on the other hand, would only lead to cheap landscape imitations with no regards to architecture, design, site characteristics, and climate.

After all, a landscape architect has the necessary training: they have to complete a five year degree course in architecture and then study for another two years before caming a master's degree in lands., architecture.

landscape architects design spaces big and small, these can be private garden landscapes for hospitals, hotels, shopping malls and housing schemes to large public gardens and roads. It can also involve rejuvenation and development of lakes, riverfronts, wetlands, and min./quart. lands. Alandscape architect wouldn't just design planting schemes along roads or rotaries, but would lay out the roads and incorporate the intrinsic beauty of the landscape into the design.

Today, aesthetics are an important part of developments and landscape professionals are engaged since the initial planning stage of any scheme.

Pitched roof reigns to skyline,


Triangular tiers resembling the Pine...

proposals accordingly. It helps students to bring their abilities into the foreground and to develop their knowledge. One of the other important parts of the first year design studio is to learn to communicate with the tutors and to express their ideas to the audience. Collaborative Learning The hands on approach to learning, exploring by experiencing, the process of questioning the given and being encouraged to ask as many questions to satisfy once curiosity is what is expected from a faculty. The





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ALTERNATIVE PAPER PAPER FROM ELEPHANT DUNG

Animal waste is a messy fact of daily life in rural communities. This byproduct of life has many uses - but an ingredient for making writing paper is probably not the first that springs to mind.



According to the Environmental Paper Network (50 percent of the world's forests have been destroyed, and 80 percent of the remaining forests are in a degraded state). By turning to alternative sources to make paper, trees are saved and vast quantities of energy reduced.

It is proof that it just takes creativity and a new perspective to turn something considered as waste into wealth: and jobs and sustainable incomes.

Haathi Chaap is a brand of paper manufactured in Rajasthan, India, out of elephant dung. The name comes from 'Haathi', meaning 'Elephant' in Hindi and 'Chaap' whi ch means 'press' or 'imprint'. Elephant dung paper was probably first made in Thailand. Other than in India, elephant dung paper is also being manufactured in Sri Lanka and South Africa.

The cleaning of the dung is one of the most important processes. The dung is washed thoroughly with water in large water tanks. The water of the dung is used as fertilizers in the field, and the dung is dried up and used to manufacture paper.

Manufacturing Process

- First, elephant dung is dried, washed and disinfected, so that only clean fibre remains.
- This fibre is sorted to remove all non-dung fibres.
- The sorted fibre is boiled for at least four hours in a vat to ensure the fibres are clean and soft.
- The manufacturing process thereafter is similar to that of handmade paper.
- The boiled pulp is then put through pulp beaters. Colours or dyes are added when the pulp is beaten in the beater.
- The pulp is mixed with water, and lifted up on flat sieves, to dry into reams of paper.
- Once the paper has dried, it is either smoothened by stones or by passing it through a
 calendering machine to make it smooth and usable.
- The process of making elephant dung paper takes about 13 days three days of sorting, boiling and disinfecting, followed by 10 days to pulp, mix, press and dry the paper.

Products

- Various products were made using elephant dung:
- Bags, Photo Album, Notebooks, Cards, Etc.

Changing face of wasterwater through Decentralised wastewater treatment system

Decentralized management of wastewater, which has been defined as the collection, treatment, and reuse of wastewater at or near the point of generation. Most of this wastewater is treated at the household, although small systems that serve clusters or housing developments are becoming more common. Decentralized Wastewater Treatment Systems is a technical approach, which is locally organized by the local people.

Given the overall sanitation situation in India, there is a need to promote decentralized initiatives in waste water treatment.

Decentralized and low-cost options are commonly viewed as solutions for the poor and / or for underdeveloped areas. It consist of a settler, anaerobic baffled septic tank, filter bed of gravel, sand, plantation-beds and a pond. The open pond stores the treated water and keeps it available for re-use.

The system operates without mechanical means and sewage flows by gravity, through the different components of the system. The main objective of this system is to recycle, reuse wastewater. It is based on the principle of low-maintenance since most important parts of the system work without electricity.

1) Decentralised wastewater treatment system at Aravind Eye Hospital, Pondicherry



Project Background: The wastewater is received from hospital building that includes only domestic sewage. Decentralised was adopted to meet the demand of huge water requirement for horticulture and maintaining the lush green area of 15 acres within the hospital premises.

2) Decentralised wastewater treatment system at Friends of Camphill, Bangalore

Project Background

Friends of Camphill, Bangalore implemented this system for the purpose of safe disposal of wastewater generated from domestic sources and to ensure self sustainability. The domestic sewage generated from kitchen, toilets, bathrooms and laundry areas is treated on site.

Decentralised wastewater treatment system at Bankers



Colony, Bhuj

Project Background

The aim of this project was to showcase the best practice in the area of wastewater management and how wastewater can be treated and reused locally for horticulture purpose. The Bankers colony is below the level of the main sewer line; so it was not connected to the main sewerage. The treated wastewater is reused for horticulture purpose in order to develop the green belt in the region.



4) Decentralised Wastewater Treatment System at Kachpura village in Agra

Project Background

Decentralised wastewater treatment system at Kachpura slum was a part of Crossculling Agra Prografor low income communities. The aim of the programme was to improve the sanitation conditions in the Slum areas.

Benefits of the Decentralized Wastowater System-

Decentralized and low-cost

options are commonly viewed as solutions for the poor and / or for underdeveloped areas.

To minimize waste going out of the habitats at micro-level and also at a macro-level. A large amount off domestic and non-toxic industrial sewage can be treated by this system. The biggest benefit in using this system is ,that it does not require electricity to run the treatment plant, the whole technique is based on the concept of Gravity. The system operates without mechanical means and sewage flows by gravity.



Enchanting, Surreal, Mesmerizing.. Gardens by the Bay

It's our first day in Singapore, and our Tour guide informs us that today evening we have an option to visit any place of our choice. He takes out the Singapore Guide book and tells us to choose one place. I



don't need to look in the book. I have dreamed of this place since so many months, and this place remained the only reason why I had come to this city. " Gardens by the Bay", I tell him, "I want to go there". And to my great surprise, all of the members of our tour members unanimously decide to visit this place and the guide happily booked our tickets costing 32 Singapore dollars each that included to and fro travel from our hotel.

At sharp 5.00 pm, our taxi arrives and we eagerly pile up and start our journey towards my dreamland. Singapore is a tiny yet very prosperous city, with huge wide roads, tall, majestic skyscrapers and one of the worlds largest harbours. En route, our guide gives the information about the place we are about to visit. Gardens by the Bay is a nature park spanning 101 hectares of reclaimed land in Central Singapore, and is divided into three parts: Bay South, Bay East and Bay Central Garden. We would be visiting the Bay South Garden which is the largest measuring 54 hectares. The gardens are located adjacent to the famous Marina Reservoir.

Our taxi reaches the parking area, and we step down with tickets clutched tightly in our





hand. Its a huge area, with lush green lawns. beautiful flowers, a n d trees welcoming us. Various stone sculpures adorn the lawns, and huge artifical trees form a grove at the entrance, Neatly paved roads, signboards and spollessly clean surroundings add to the beauty of the gardens. In the background, we can see the 7 Star

hotel "Marina Bay Sands", which is world famous due to its Architecture: it has three 55 story hotel towers connected by a 1 hectare roof terrace shaped like a Ship! My neck starts aching from looking around, and still I cant decide what is more beautiful!

We now proceed to the Conservatory complex that comprises two conservatories, The Flower Dome and the Cloud Forest. We had seen these two huge dome shaped glass structures from far apart, and were eager to go and see what actually was inside. First we proceed to the flower dome which is the world's largest column less glasshouse. And once we enter, nothing prevents us from getting floored by the astonishing grandeur of the place. The sheer vastness of the glass enclosed space takes our breath away. It covers about a hectare without a single column, and is entirely air conditioned without any actual duct visible to our naked eyes. And after we stop marveling at the roof, our eyes start noticing the hundreds of types of trees and thousands of flowers that are all welcoming us with open arms and nodding heads.

Its all neatly laid out, with proper circulation space left for the tourists, beautiful natural and artificial flowers and sculptures designed to make the most depressed person happy to the core! There are orchids, tulips, daisies, lilies and hundreds of types of flowers that take our hearts away. It takes more than an hour to stroll around and take pies and with great effort we tear ourself out of the dome and now head to the Cloud forest dome, another glass clad, columnless, 0.8 hectare vast building that is higher than the Flower Dome.

As we enter the Cloud Forest, a cool, moist breeze touches our face. And we learn that the tropical mountain climate has been specially created here to grow the special trees found in these areas. We walk a few meters inside, and lo ! A 35 meter high artificial waterfall cascading down from a 42 meter high mountain stands right in front of us. We crane our necks to take in the vast water body with the mountain showing its various floors accessible by elevators and escalators. Beautiful changing lights makes the waterfall more stunning, and we proceed to the interior of the mountain, a man made concrete building covered entirely with artificial and natural greenery.

Our path inside the building is lined with green trees and colorful flowers, and a moist spray cools our face throughout our journey inside the dome. A number of walkways and ramps crisscross the dome at various levels, allowing the visitors to see the waterfall from different angles. Inside we go, and every floor shows a new aspect of the natural wonders of the world. One floor has tropical trees and flowers while others has carnivorous plants. Another floor shows off the caves carrying stalactites and stalagmites. It is all so beautiful that my eyes almost hurt.
